History of Corrugated

- 950 bc/bce**
The ancient Egyptians produced the first writing material by pasting together thin layers of papyrus stems.
- 100 ad/ce**
The Chinese created the first authentic paper from bamboo and mulberry fibers.
- 1400s**
Paper mills appeared in Spain, Italy, Germany and France.
- 1452**
Johannes Gutenberg invented the printing press. The idea of movable type revolutionized the mass production and circulation of literature.
- 1690**
The first sheet paper mill in North America was built near Philadelphia.
- 1767**
England wanted to regain their loss of colonial paper exports. They imposed the Stamp Act, which included a tax on all paper made in the colonies. Many consider this act for the American Revolution.
